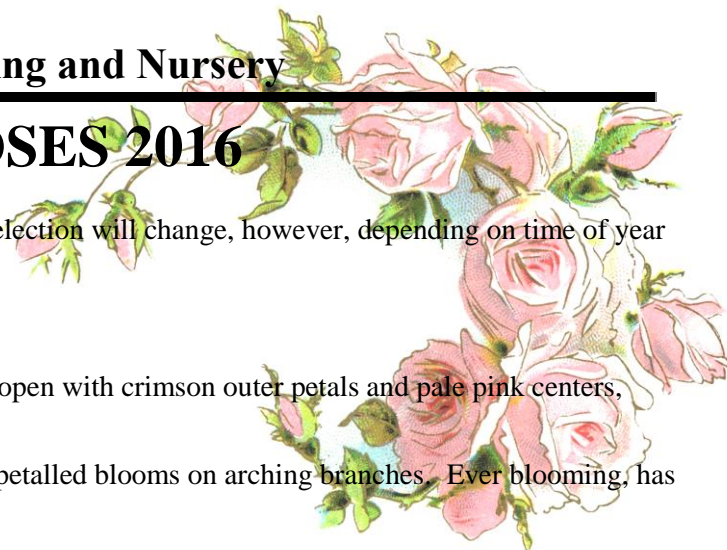




ANTIQUE ROSES 2016



The following varieties of Antique Roses are generally in stock - the selection will change, however, depending on time of year and product availability.

ARCHDUKE CHARLES (prior to 1837) – China – Fragrant blooms open with crimson outer petals and pale pink centers, darken to solid crimson. Upright habit - 3 to 5 ft.

BALLERINA (1937) – Hybrid Musk – Clusters of small pink, single petalled blooms on arching branches. Ever blooming, has fall hips, 5 x 6 ft shrub or 6 to 10 ft climber.

CALDWELL PINK Ever blooming 'polyantha type' rose – clusters of lavender pink blooms on a compact bush. Good for landscape or container use, grows 3 to 4 ft.

CECILE BRUNNER (1881) – Polyantha - Small pink, fragrant blooms from mid spring to frost. The "Sweetheart Rose" is lightly scented, long-lived and healthy – 3 to 4 feet.

KATY ROAD PINK (found rose) – Fragrant, vivid pink blooms produced season long on easy to grow plant. Good insect and disease resistance, 3 to 5 ft.

KIRSTEN POULSEN (1924) – Vivid reddish pink single flowers on an erect bush with dark green foliage. Use as low hedge or single specimen, 3 to 5 ft.

LA MARNE (1915) – Perfect for hedge, prefers open sunny areas. Pink/white fragrant blooms, 4 to 6 ft.

MARCHESA BOCELLA (1842) – Hybrid Perpetual –Fragrant blooms of delicate pink. 3 to 5ft.

MARIE PAVIE (1888) – Polyantha – Outstanding landscape plant can be used for containers, borders or specimens. Pale pink buds, fragrant white blooms 3 to 4 ft.

MARTHA GONZALES (1984) – Scarlet, single blooms and reddish foliage on a bushy shrub. Great for massing in the landscape, 2 to 3 ft.

MRS DUDLEY CROSS (1907) – Tea – Pale yellow flowers often blushed pink. Stems almost thorn less and foliage healthy. Fragrant, ever blooming, 3 to 6 ft.

MUTABILIS (prior to 1894) – China – Often known as "the Butterfly Rose" with single petalled blooms opening apricot-yellow and aging red. Shrubby growth, 4 to 7ft.

OLD BLUSH (1752) – China – Lavender pink blooms produced freely on easy to grow bush. Fragrant, upright, 3 to 6 ft.

SOMBREUIL (CLIMBER) (1850) – Tea – White, quartered blooms on a mannerly climber. Can be used as a pillar rose or trained on a fence or trellis. Fragrant, 8 to 12 ft.

SOUVENIR DE LA MALMAISON (CLIMBER) (1843)-White, light pink shading, darker outer petals. Strong, tea fragrance. Average diameter 5". Large, very double, borne mostly solitary, in small clusters, cupped-to-flat, quartered bloom form.

THE FAIRY (1932) – Polyantha - Small, double, pale pink blooms produced on spreading plant. Can be used as a mass planting or a trailer. Glossy foliage, 3 to 4 ft.

VALENTINE (1951) – Velvety, semi-double flowers of rich scarlet. Nearly thorn less & carefree. 3 to 4 ft.
